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PRASERTCHAI SUKSA-ARD: SELECTED FACTORS AFFECTING AGGRESSIVE
BEHAVIOR IN SPORT OF UNIVERSITY ATHLETES WITH DIFFERENT ABILITIES
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The purposes of this research were (1) to investigate selected factors affecting aggressive behavior in sport of the university athletes with different abilities, (2) to investigate causal factors related to aggressive behavior in sport of the university athletes with low and high abilities. The samples comprised of 400 athletes who were multi-stage stratified random sampled from both government and private universities. Questionnaires and the state-Trait Anxiety Inventory, form Y developed by Spielberger et al. were used for data collection. Path analysis was applied to analyze the obtained data.

The results of the study were as follows:

- 1. The selected factors directly affecting aggressive behavior in sport of university athletes, which were significant at .05 level, were role model of peer, role model of coach, democracy training and anxiety, respectively. These factors could predict the aggressive behavior in athletes at about 43.3 percent.
- 2. The causal factors directly related to aggressive behavior in sport of the university athletes with low ability which were significant at .05 level, were role model of coach, peer reinforcement, democracy training and anxiety, respectively. These factors could predict the aggressive behavior in athletes at about 43.1 percent.
- 3. The causal factors directly related to aggressive behavior in sport of the university athletes with high ability, which were significant at .05 level, were role model of peer, role model of coach and democracy training, respectively. These factors could predict the aggressive behavior in athletes at about 51 percent.

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
