The purpose of this thesis was to compare the ability to adjust with peers of late adolescents with different sex roles.

Results of the study are as follow:

- 1. Adolescents with different sex roles show significant different in their ability to adjust to peers (P  $\langle$  .001)
- 2. Male adolescents with masculine sex roles have more ability to adjust to peers than male adolescents with androgynous sex roles, male adolescents with feminine sex roles and male adolescents with undifferentiated sex roles (P  $\langle$  .001)
- 3. Female adolescents with androgynous sex roles have more ability to adjust to peers than female adolescents with masculine sex roles, female adolescents with feminine sex roles and female adolescents with undifferentiated sex roles (P < .001)
- 4. Adolescents with undifferentialed sex roles show the lowest ability to adjust to peers (P  $\langle$  .001)
