## CHAPTER FOUR RESULTS

This chapter reports the results of the study. The data collected from 50 respondent are summarized in table form with descriptions. The study is aimed at finding out the needs of the officers at the Office of the National Security Council of Thailand in studying English. The results shown below consist of two parts; the first part is general background of the respondents and the second part is their needs in studying English.

## 4.1 GENERAL BACKGROUND

The respondents in the study were 50 officers at Office of the National Security Council Thailand. In this part, the data of gender, age, education, experiences in studying English and overall English ability are show.

According to the table, most of respondents were male (58.0%) and the rest were female (42.0%). This is because, there are more male officers than female officers serving in the NSC.

Table 2 shows that the majority of the officers in this study were aged over 40 (28.0%). The next greatest numbers were aged between 31-35 (12%). There were 4 officers aged less than 25 years old (8.0%).

Table 3 indicates that the biggest number of officers, that is 24 officers (48%) hold a Bachelor's degree. Twenty-three officers (46%) obtained a Master's degree with 4% Diploma and 2% Certificate levels.

Table 4 shows that many of the officers (62%) had experience in studying English more than 10 years. A smaller number of officers (20%) and (18%) had studied English for 5-9 years and 9% less than 5 years.

According to table 5, 42%, of the officers rated their English knowledge and skills as fair and 30% thought they were poor whereas 13% rated their English as good and 1% rated their English as very good.

Table 6 shows that 28% of the officers never improve their English in their daily lives. However, the most popular method used to practice English of the officers is watching TV news in English (20%) followed by listening to English songs (16%), listen to English radio broadcasts (14%), seeing English soundtrack movies and surf website (10%), and the least popular method used is to read English journals/newspapers (1%).

## 4.2 NEEDS IN STUDY IN ENGLISH

According to table7, most respondents need to study English but the majority want to study English because of their personal interest (31%) whereas 15% need to study because of work and 4% have no need to study English.

Table 12 shows that most of the officers preferred practicing listening to daily conversation (4.20), listening to TV news/VDO (3.90), pronunciation (3.86), listening to academic lectures (3.80), and listening to English soundtrack movies in English course. Listening only to English songs is moderately needed.

Table 13 indicates that the speaking activities extensively needed to be practiced are asking and answering questions (4.28), followed by daily conservation (4.20), and presentation (3.88).

According to table 14, the need level for reading activities of officers most extensively need is reading for the main idea (4.24), followed by reading English newspapers, critical reading (3.86), getting the meaning of words from context (3.78), and reading English academic books (3.68). Only speed reading was moderate needed.

According to table 15, for writing activities all officers most need are taking notes from lectures (4.12), followed by writing official letters (4.08), reviewing grammatical structure (4.06), writing e-mail (3.84), writing essays (3.82) and taking notes from textbooks (3.74).
