

This study was aimed to study the factors related to the marital quality among pre-marital college cohabiters. The sample were 400 undergraduate students at public university, studying with their couple and were willing to participate in the study. Their identification were confidential. Forty key informants were randomly picked from the full 70, then 400 college students were interviewed. Descriptive statistics, Chi-square and Pearson Product Moment were used in data analysis.

The results revealed that the sample stayed with their couple for only 1-2 years prior to marriage. Most of the sample were from the families with legally marriage and their parents still stay together. The sample choosed to stay at the dormitory or rental houses. Condom and oral birth control pill were two commonly used birth control. The finding also showed that 10.75 percent of the sample used to get pregnant and 9.50 percent choosed to terminate their pregnancy. 63.8 percent of the sample couples with no pregnant record also stated that they would have terminated their pregnancy.

For the factors related to the marital quality, economic status, roles fit factors, social support factors, parental models and ideal factors about marriage were correlated with the marital quality of a pre-marital cohabiters couple life.
