The purpose of this study was to determine the relationships between perception of economic crisis and food consumption behavioral changes that were classified as food consumption behavioral changes in purchasing, food consumption behavioral changes in cooking and dietary pattern changes. The participants were 238 registered nurses who held positions of level PC. 4, 5 and 6 at Siriraj Hospital. These nurses' incomes decreased because of economic crisis in 1998 - 1999. The data were collected by self-administered questionnaires during 1-30, April 1999.

The results showed that most registered nurses (75.63%) had medium level of perception of economic crisis. Most of them had medium level of food consumption behavioral changes in purchasing, food consumption behavioral changes in cooking and dietary pattern changes (66.4%, 75.2% and 56.7% respectively). Perception of economic crisis and food consumption behavioral changes in purchasing, food consumption behavioral changes in cooking and dietary pattern changes were found to have positive relationship (r = 0.146, 0.208 and 0.142 respectively at P < .05). Marital status and food consumption behavioral changes in purchasing and dietary pattern changes were found to have negative relationship (r = -0.168 and -0.164 respectively at P < .05). Extra income and dietary pattern changes were found to have negative relationship (r = -0.166 at P < .05). The results of this study showed that perception of economic crisis had a favourable effect on food consumption behavioral changes resulting in more economical and appropriate practices in accordance with the prescribed principle of nutrition.
