This is qualitative research. The purpose of this research is to study about the honorific ranks in Buddhism in Thailand. It is comprised of both documents and field study using a questionnaire for Buddhist monks currently in higher education and interviews with the Buddhist scholars on attitudes of honorific ranks.

The results of document research show that honorific ranks were started in the Buddha period, and were called *Atatatkha*. These positions were given to various honorable expert disciples. In Thailand, The honorific ranks began in the Sukhothai period and were given to the knowledgeable monks in the King Ram Kam Haeng Era for monastic execution. During Ayuthaya, Thonburi, and early Rattanakosin periods, this system was adopted and changed. It was clearly developed in the King Rama Six Era. At present, the honorific ranks in Buddhism has supported the monastic administration.

The results of field research show that the honorific ranks were the ranks of decorations which the king had given to Buddhist monks for the monastic administration. These ranks show the relationship between the institution of the king and the Sangka institution. These ranks are considered as the mediator between good and bad depending on the involved persons who accept this position. The fame associated with this position could lead to the wrong practice. So, the consideration of honorific ranks should be amended strictly according to the doctrine. The suitable honorific ranks should be clear and adjudge and truly benefit religion and society for all more than anyone or any group's own benefit. This will be the great benefit to Buddhism.
