## **ABSTRACT**

This research was to study the multi-factors correlating with attorneys' intention to work after retirement. The subjects were 298 attorneys at the age of 50-59. Multiple Regression Analysis was used. The finding revealed that;

- 1. The subjects had the intermediate level of intention to work after retirement. The high intention was to have their own work, while to devote themselves to society was the moderate intention, and to be an employee was the lowest intention.
- 2. The intention to work after retirement positively correlated (p < .01) with the attitudes toward working after their retirement, the adequacy of income, the expectancy from others and devotion for the society.
- 3. The intention to have their own work positively correlated (p < .01) with the attitudes toward working after retirement, the adequacy of income, the need to increase economic status and the belief in opportunity to work.

- 4. The intention to be employees positively correlated (p < .01) with the attitudes toward working after their retirement, and the prestige of the aging.
- 5. The intention to choose the type of work devoted to the society positively correlated (p < .01) with the desire to work for the society.
- 6. The samples' preparation for the readiness to work after retirement was moderate.

With such findings, it is expected that the attorneys' behavior toward working after retirement would be in the desirable direction, namely the sample group would have their own work and work for the benefit of the society after retirement. Accordingly, the researcher recommends the Office of Attorney General to set up an educational program to prepare attorneys to work after retirement by using the principle of self-education and by providing information in every aspect. Accordingly, the sample group by themselves should practice how to use basic computer skills from the information provided by the Office of Attorney General.
